Welcome to Rai Valley's the first newsletter for 2019. This week we receive some very sad news. Jacqui Swanson's partner died suddenly in the weekend. Jacqui is a regular reliever in our school. Our sincerest sympathies to her and her family at this very difficult time.

We have begun the year with a stable staff and we are very fortunate to be fully staffed. Students have settled quickly into classes and work despite the heat. This year we are pleased to welcome 10 new students and their families to our school. 9 of our new students have joined the primary department. I am sure that their time at Rai Valley will be very positive.

Recently, we have received the confirmed report from the Education Review Office from their visit in term 4. It is a pleasing report that acknowledges what the school has been doing well in recent years and supports our direction for the future. The report will be available on the school website in the next few days or a paper copy will be available from the office.

The 2018 NCEA results for our senior students are really pleasing. All students who entered NCEA and completed the year have been successful. A huge congratulation to you all!

This year we are excited to be able to offer subjects through Net New Zealand to enhance our senior curriculum. This has meant that some of our student are now able to study electronics, computer programming, Te Reo, health and biology. They have a weekly face to face session with their teacher and their class. Work is set for the other lessons during the week. The teachers come from a range of schools throughout New Zealand and are offering full NCEA courses.

The school pool is an amazing asset in this very hot weather. It is great that students can swim daily. I would like to remind parents to ensure that their children have their hats with them and have sunblock applied when they come to school.

Term 1 is a busy time for school trips and camps. Thank you in advance to the parents who make these trips possible with your generous support. A number of the senior student are now training daily for the Area Schools tournament in Collingwood at the beginning of April.

This is the year of Board of Trustee elections. The election date has been set for June 7th. I would encourage you all to think about being a Trustee, particularly in this time of major educational change. Secondary News

Students say, “School is Net!”

Senior secondary students are enjoying Rai’s access to NET.NZ. NET.NZ is an alternative to the correspondence school, Te Kura, and offers a large range of subjects online. The difference with NET.NZ, however, is that they offer one lesson a week where students have facetime with teachers. Many also have virtual classrooms of between 10-18 students from around New Zealand who can join in class discussions and other classroom activities with their peers.

Year 12 student, Chloe Wellman, who is taking Business Studies this year, was the first student at Rai to attend one of the virtual lessons. She seemed to enjoy having immediate access to a Business Studies teacher as well as the ability to seek instant clarification on concepts and tasks.

Seven Rai Students, ranging from year 11 to year 13, opted to take classes via NET.NZ so far this year. In addition to Business Studies, subjects chosen include: Electronics, Health, Te Reo, Physics, Biology, History and Computer Science.

The biggest bonus for senior students is that they can access all areas of the New Zealand Curriculum without having to sacrifice the benefits of being at a small Area School.

While still in its infancy, Principal Maree Furness, who is acting as E-Dean for those students enrolled, hopes it will become a regular part of the ways in which the school continues to try and meet the individual needs of its senior students.

Lessons are currently being held in classrooms or the school library but will eventually move to the school’s video conferencing room once everything is up and running.

A very warm welcome to returning students and their families and to students who are joining us this year, along with their families. We welcome Jeanne in Year 12, Sam in Year 11. We are very much looking forward to having you at our school

The release of NCEA results is always an exciting time for teachers and students alike. We are very proud of the 100% pass rate of all of our students in Years 11-13 who completed the academic year. External exams produced some very pleasing results and reflect the hard work of students and massive support from teachers and family members. Two students, Alec Johnston and Anita Aitchison both achieved NCEA Levels 2 and 3 in 2018; this is a stunning achievement. Congratulations also to Jordan Wearing and Kade Martin who both achieved Merit Endorsements for the year.

NetNZ offers blended learning opportunities, with a lot of online learning, as well as a weekly online tutorial with their expert subject teacher. Ms Furness, our principal, has taken on the role of eDean (electronic Dean) to further support students with their NetNZ studies.

So, 16th March is shaping up to be an even greater success than 2018 and the Committee is hoping it will be able to return an even greater dividend to our community groups.



Rai Valley Conservation Kids

Kaipupu Point Wild Life Sanctuary

On 2nd Dec, we headed out for an adventure at Kaipupu Point Wild life sanctuary just out of Picton. Before we went Andrew from Forest and Bird taught us all about the local bird life, he showed us the different pest's and how the trap them.

We then headed by boat the the sanctuary. Once we got there Andrew walked us around the sanctuary teaching us about the predator fence and showing us how the door system works.



We walked all around the sanctuary, right up to the top were we found our first Kiwi Guardian Post.



We got to explore and play. We learnt a lot about pests and trapping them to help look after our local wild life. We had so much, it was a great day out.

We have recently started a kids conservation club to try and help encourage the kids of the Rai/Pelorus region to get out doors and learn about our environment around us and to help motivate our kids to get out and about and active. Using the DOC Kiwi Guardian activities as a base for the activities we aim to plan one conservation based activity each month. We would love to share with you some of the adventures we have been on so far.

Andrew taught us how to tell the difference between a Kanuka and a Manuka. He also showed us how to crush and smell different leaves to work out what plant they are.
