The first time I went to the sea, I drank the water and started crying because of the salt.


The fifth time I went to the sea I swam for about three hours until I got out, but when I did my chest started hurting. I've never wanted to swim in the sea again.

Important Notice

Advice from the Ministry of Education following Friday's attacks

Netsafe has received a number of reports of online content relating to the attacks in Christchurch and has asked us to disseminate the following advisory to schools.

Footage of the attacks has been deemed objectionable under New Zealand law which means that possessing or distributing the footage is an offence. Anyone who finds footage of the attacks online should report it to Netsafe at netsafe.org.nz/report but they should not keep copies or share it. Netsafe encourages schools to speak with students about what to do if they come across the footage and about the fact that sharing the footage with this classification is against the law. The footage of the Christchurch attacks is disturbing and will be harmful for people to see. If students have viewed the video and are struggling with what they have seen, it's likely they will require additional support. Agencies which can provide free support include Youthline, Need to Talk and Kidsline.

While the content is online there is some risk that children or young people may come across it. Netsafe encourages schools and parents to proactively discuss with young people what they should do if they come across distressing content online. 

Youth Lab – Havelock Vision 2020

In December 2018, Havelock Vision 2020 and Sport Tasman ran a Youth Lab in Havelock to survey people between the ages of 11-18 years of age. The aim of the survey was to find out what Youth wanted to do in their local area. The lab was followed up by a visit to Rai Valley School.

Thirty-two Youth participated in the survey. The results of the survey found that the 4 main ideas for activities were Zorb Ball Activities, Outdoor Movie night, Go karts/Wind karts and Kayaking. These were the most popular activities, but other ideas submitted were video making, horse riding, paintball, paddle boarding, mountain biking, cooking, flip out, laser tag and rock climbing. 53% of participants wanted the activity to run all year round.

Havelock Vision 2020 and Sport Tasman have taken these results on board and are looking at ways to get these activities up and running in the Pelorus area. If you would like more information or have any further suggestion on activities, please email havelockv2020@gmail.com.

NZTA: SAFE ROADS: SH6 NELSON TO BLENHEIM

Last Friday between 3pm & 6pm, community members had the opportunity to give feedback about SH6 Nelson to Blenheim. Our school sits in the middle of this, so I took myself down to the fire station to voice a few things I think are important for our students and wider community.

I said we had concerns about the speed motorists travel passed the school (I was told at this meeting their figures show that the average speed recorded from the camera is actually IOOkm which is shocking!). I brought up about how the road narrows at Alfred Stream – this brings students closer to vehicles travelling on SH6, how we needed some safe spot for students to be able to cross SH6 heading into the village from school (if they need to cross as the subdivision etc are on the other side of the road) and about how we have a lack of safe passage for cyclists and walkers coming to school beyond the approx. Ikm stretch of footpath that is supplied in the village. This becomes an issue for students as the bus travel criteria set by the Ministry of Education is Year I-8 you have to be 3.2km from school for bus pick up and from Year 9-13 this extends out to 4.8km from school for bus pick up. From both directions this leaves a lack of safe space for students who can't be dropped at school by parents and have to travel by bike or feet.

The hosts of the Community feedback meeting on Friday suggested I put this in our newsletter and encourage parents and community to jump online and use the interactive map to give your own feedback.

So please voice your opinions to them via the below links in the pictures and maybe we will see some change come our way to make the roads safer for our children and anyone else who travels in these dangerous areas.
