Kia ora koutou

Welcome back to Term 4 of a very weird and often stressful year. It was a real pleasure to see so many of you last week at the annual pet day events. I really want to acknowledge the support that we receive from the community. Without your support and very generous giving of your time, we would not be able to hold pet day in this way, so a huge heartfelt thanks.

This Friday we are hosting Group Day for the Pelorus schools. We are very fortunate to be able to use the Carluke Showground for this event. The weather is looking good for Friday so hopefully we will see a number of you there.

In the first week of the Term, it was a pleasure to see a number of you at the Secondary Celebration of learning. It is great for students to be able to share some of their learning with their families. For our Years 11 and 12 students and their teachers, this is a really busy time of year. There are 13 school days left before examinations begin and the NMIT trades programme is finishing for the year. At this time it is important that students focus on revision and work closely with their teachers talking through any concerns.

Mrs Davies has been on sick leave for the first few weeks of this term. In her absence Miss McKinley has been picking up responsibility for primary until she returns. Mrs Upsall has picked up the SENCO responsibilities in Mrs. Davies's absences. Mrs Davies's return to work will be gradual over a number of weeks. Anyone who has been into school recently will have seen the building that is happening at the front of the school. The Ministry of Education is providing an office for the Learning Support Co-ordinator position (Mrs. Upsall). As this office had to be positioned at the front of the school the Board has used the opportunity to build a new principal's office attached to the LSC office. It is expected that this building will be completed by the end of November.

As a consequence of the building, entry into school has become a lot more restricted. Entry into the main office is now through the gate behind the old boiler or the library entrance. The entry to school is much more congested than usual particularly at the end of school.

Learning Support Coordinator

Body awareness/ Interoception

I learned a new word this week. **Interoception** is your perception of the internal state of your body, whether you are hungry or thirsty, if you are tired or energised, your breathing and heart rate, your muscles and nerves. It includes awareness of when you need to use the toilet.

Some people lack interoception, and in particular, children on the autistic spectrum. They have trouble connecting to their biological or physical self. They may not eat enough, they may become dehydrated and develop a headache. They may not recognise when they are tired or physically stressed, causing irritability and so on.

A child who lacks interoception needs to be taught strategies to compensate for this. For example:

- Develop a routine for meals, a regular time each day (and they may need more regular feeding than other children)
- Have a routine for toileting or they may get 'caught short'. •
- Teach them to notice if their urine smells or is dark they may be dehydrated.
- Teach them to monitor their heart rate how to take a pulse or wear a heart rate smart watch and know what a healthy heart rate is and what to do if it's too high.
- Teach them to check a weather app each day that predicts the air temperature and dress accordingly as they may not notice when they are too hot or too cold.
- Teach them to notice the clothes others are wearing, and when they are stripping off sweatshirts or adding layers, they should copy them.

Thank you to students and whanau for attending the secondary school celebration evening last Thursday.

It was great to see parents and caregivers turn up to observe their child's work, speak to teachers and have a good old catch-up with others in our school community. It was a good opportunity for the Year 7 and 8 students to get a overview of what happens in our secondary school.

Mrs Skinner opened the event with a brief talk about helping teens at home, including:

- □ Whānau are strongly encouraged to helping to provide a balanced lifestyle of school and home learning versus work and leisure;
- At this stage in our teens' lives it is vital that study and home learning is an essential part of their daily routine. Without additional study at home to support learning at school, achieving in the external exams is made very difficult;
- Attendance at school and how vital the next few weeks are to those sitting exams.

We wish all students the best of luck with their exams and with a positive approach to learning, they are all capable of achieving. All Year 11 and 12 students have a copy of the exam timetable and if an extra is needed, see form teachers.

Already, it's week two of a five week term for the Year 11 and 12's. Students are working to achieve their respective NCEA Level credits before exams. Congratulations to Year 12 students Emma, Katie and Rose who have successfully achieved Level 2 and are now progressing with Level 3.

Year 11 and 12 subject teachers have been emailing students and parents/caregivers with an update on subjects and assessment requirements. Students have access to NZQA so a credit check can be regularly logged into. Mrs Skinner is regularly updating the data system with credit information, so NCEA results should be up-to-date.

The Year 10s are working on their ICT and Hard Technology Level 1 credits providing them with a good foundation for next year. They are proving to be a competent group of students who are completing assessments with a 'can-do' attitude. This positive approach will help them successfully achieve in Year 11.

Food Waste Buckets

We are year 12 students and we study level 2 Environmental Science. This year we choose to look into the issue of food waste globally, nationally and locally. We wanted to see if it was problem at school. We found it was and so we looked at how we could address this.

We learnt that there is no waste in nature because all the nutrients are cycled back into the environment. So by doing our project we are returning the nutrients back to the environment.

We found out that 1 million tonnes of food waste and plant matter goes to landfill a year in New Zealand. That is 320 kgs per person. On average a household throws away 3 trolley





loads of good food a year. All the households added together equals 157,398 tonnes in total which equates to 1.17 billion dollars. Globally 1.2 trillion dollars of food waste a year goes to waste.

To gather evidence to take to Ms Furness to prove that food waste is a big issue at school we did an audit. This meant emptying out rubbish bins onto a tarp and sorting out what was food scraps and what was rubbish. The result was that 45% of what was in our rubbish bins was food scraps. We hope with this project that we can decrease the amount of food scrapes going to the dump and then landfill.

So our project involved food waste buckets. We have made special frames to hold the buckets so they are able to be reached by all the students. Then once the buckets are full, we will take them home to feed to our chickens. We launched our project on Thursday 15th October and we have found it has been successful so far. We will do another audit to see if the percentage of food waste going into the rubbish bins at school has decreased.
